

Invitation to test an ancient Aboriginal model for sharing

Do you have an idea for research that you don't have time or motivation to work on? Do you need a research partner? Would you like to learn the origins of barter trading?

On Tuesday February 24th we will test an ancient Aboriginal model for sharing. We will apply it on sharing research ideas.

Background

The model for sharing resources is one of the oldest means of trade in the world. It was taught to Karl-Erik Sveiby by the Aboriginal custodian of the Nhunggabarra Law, Tex Skuthorpe. Before the European colonisation of Australia in 1788, the Australian Aborigines were sharing resources by means of a "collective" form of barter trade. It was a fair and equitable system, which sustained an even distribution of resources across the whole Australian continent.

"We" are Isabell Storsjö, Caroline Schimanski and Karl-Erik Sveiby and the test is a pilot for an "innovative session" to be held in March at the 2015 Annual Meeting of the International Association of Business and Society (IABS) Conference, which will be informing a potential paper for the subsequent conference proceedings.
